A Year of Stabilization

Every year, I'm amazed in a new way by the generous community that supports Union Gospel Mission. Nationwide, non-profit donations were down in 2022, yet you still found a way to support the work being done at the Mission.

2022 was a year of stabilization for Union Gospel Mission ministries. Most of our teams achieved full staffing for the first time since the pandemic, and we were able to upgrade our software in Accounting, Payroll, and Donor Relationships. In addition, we pursued approval to build a shelter in the LC Valley. By God's grace, we will break ground in 2023.

Friends, we are not alone in the effort to end homelessness. The 2022 UGM Annual Report reveals what we can accomplish when we work together.

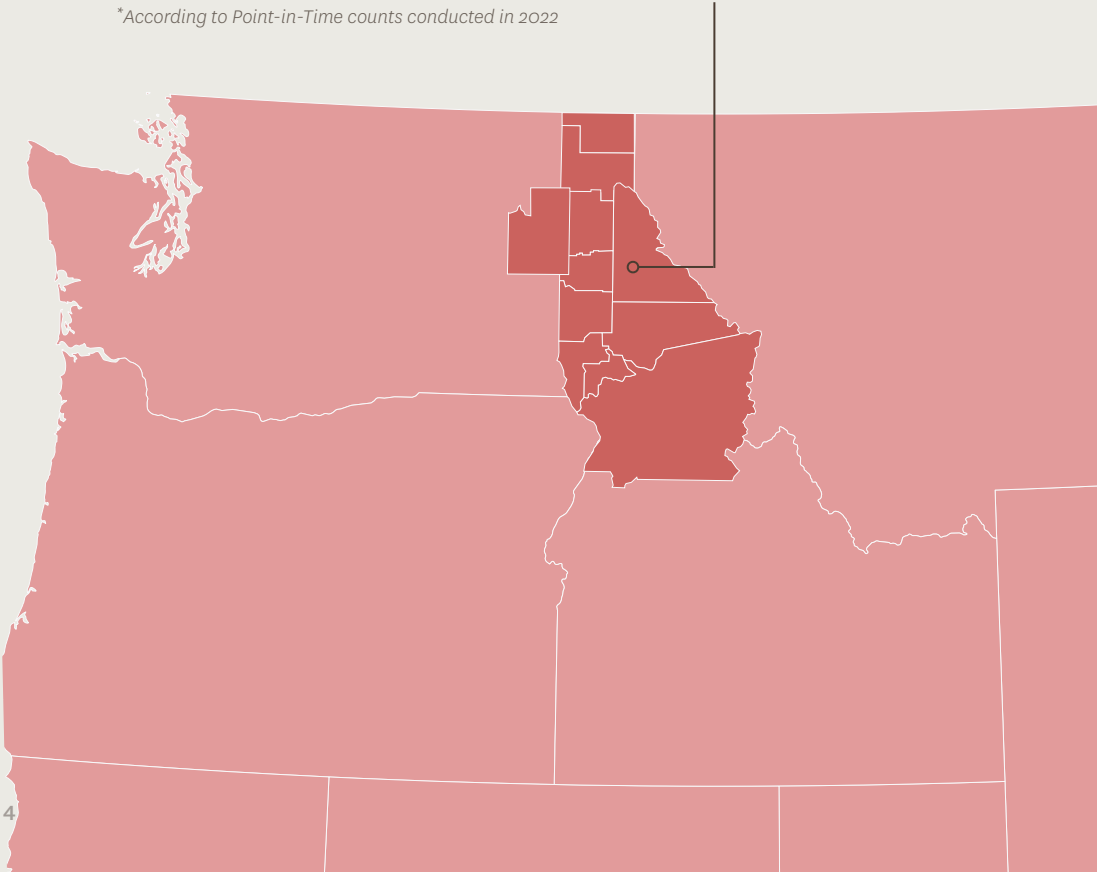

In 2022, there were **more than 2,100 people* experiencing homelessness** in Spokane County, North Idaho, and Idaho's Region 2 combined.

SNAPSHOT OF HOMELESSNESS:



Trauma is a factor for up to 72% of people who are homeless and in treatment for substance abuse.**



Approximately two thirds of those experiencing homelessness have lifetime histories of **drug or alcohol abuse.****



More than 50% of adults living in free housing for the chronically homeless have a **mental health disorder or substance abuse disorder**†.

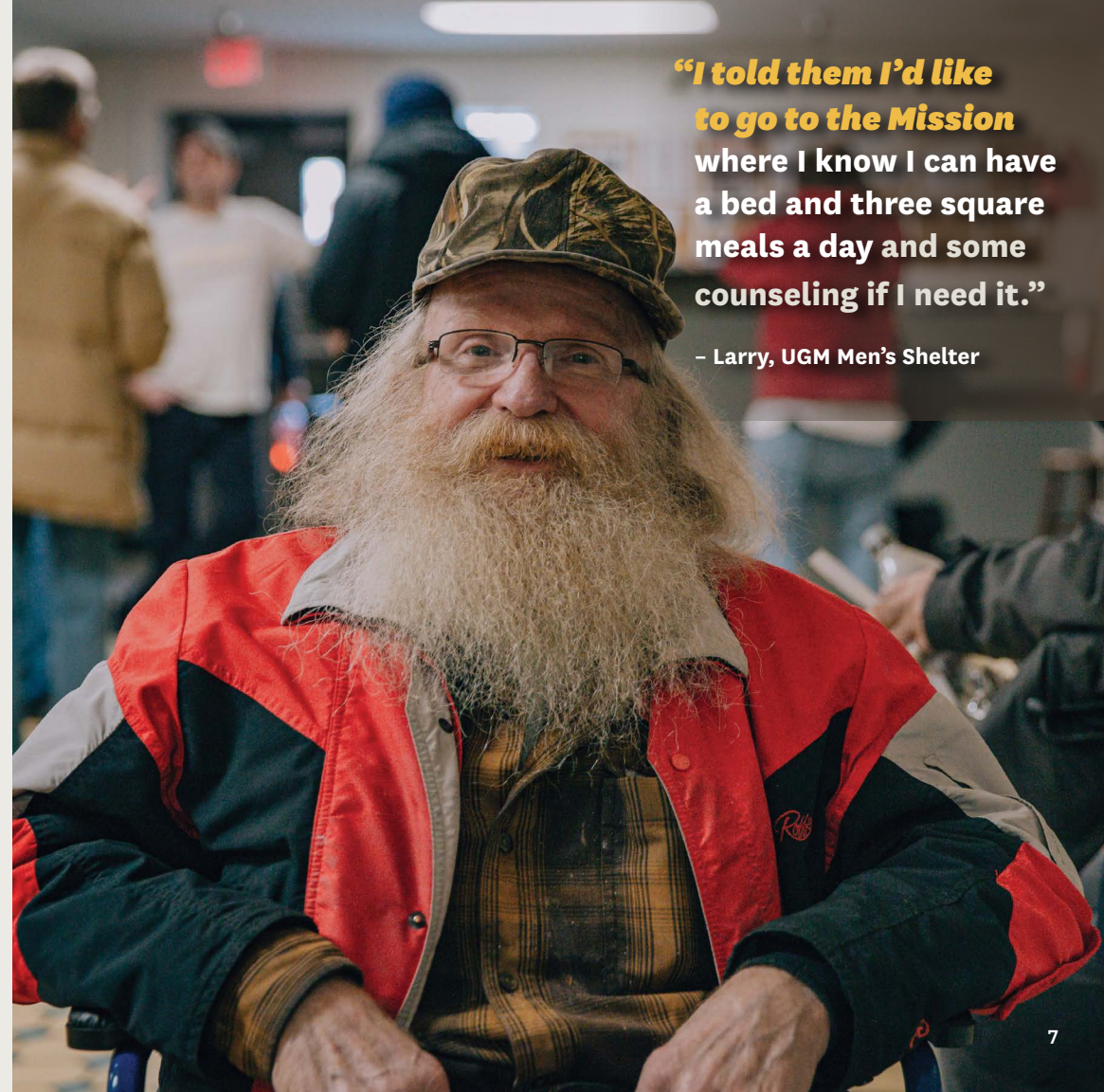

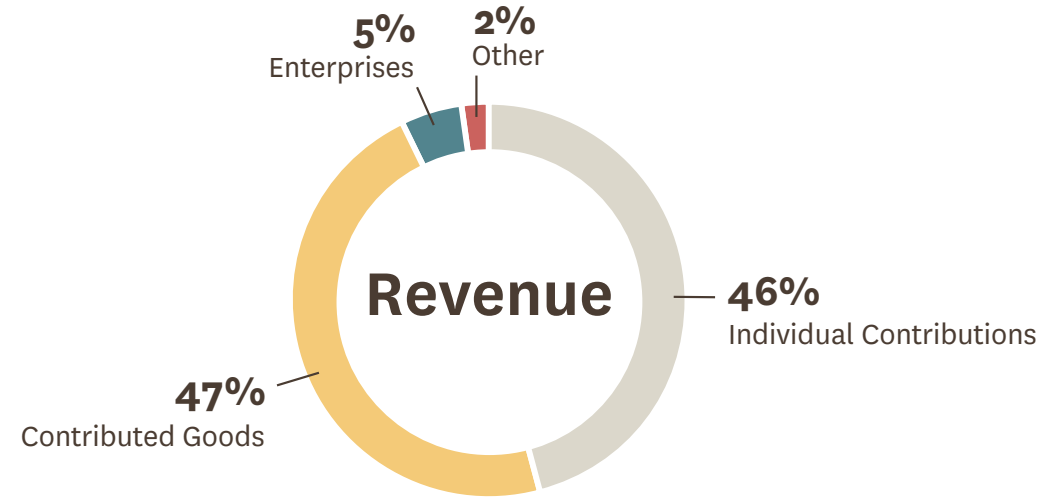
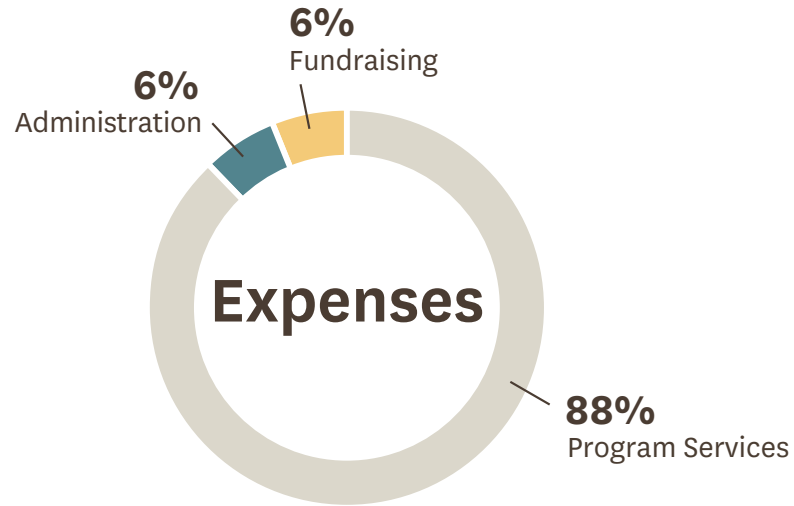
UGM Men's Aftercare Housing opened at the former site of the UGM Student Impact Center on East Sprague Ave.

Aftercare Housing is made available to men and women who have completed UGM LIFE Recovery. Rent is calculated on a sliding scale and ongoing recovery support is provided by UGM Aftercare as residents transition back into society as God-dependent, contributing members.
